SERVICE CONNECTED DISABILITIES: SUMMARY OF VA BENEFITS

- Veterans are entitled to disability compensation if they meet the following criteria:
 - They were discharged or released under conditions other than dishonorable;
 - Their disease or injury was incurred or aggravated in the line of duty; and
 - The disability is not a result of their own willful misconduct or abuse of alcohol or drugs.
- In order to receive income compensation, the veteran must have a service connected disability rating of 0% 100%. The rating will determine the amount of monthly income received (the higher the rating, the more income received).
- If a veteran has a rating of 100%, he or she is considered totally disabled and can also receive "special monthly compensation" in addition to disability compensation.
- When the VA receives a claim for service connected disability benefits, there is a 4 step determination process:
 - 1. The claim is submitted to the Regional Office in the state where the veteran resides;
 - 2. The Regional Office determines if the veteran meets the service and discharge requirements;
 - 3. The VA decides if the veteran meets the following three essential elements:
 - There must be a medical diagnosis of "current" disability;
 - There must be medical, or lay evidence, of in-service occurrence or aggravation of a disease or injury; and
 - There must be a nexus between the in-service occurrence or aggravation of a disease or injury and the current disability.

If these three elements are met, the VA determines the severity of the service connected disability and assigns a disability rating.

- 4. The VA will set an effective date for the award of benefits. The monthly compensation is then based on the disability rating and begins as of the effective date.
- Receipt of service-connected compensation may be affected based on a veteran's employment. For example, a veteran seeking Total Disability Based on Individual Unemployability (TDIU) may not engage in "substantially gainful employment" (ie, a job that earns above the poverty level).
- VA disability compensation is tax-free income.
